IDS is looking for a Research Officer to join the Accountability and Health Programme to help to deliver a number of outputs including a global convening event, two flagship publications and a special issue of the *IDS Bulletin*. The role will be based with the 'Unequal Voices' project team but will involve working across a number of projects with multiple funding partners.

The research support component of the role will involve reviewing literature, liaising with programme research partners in Bangladesh, Brazil, Mozambique and Uganda, editing research reports and other outputs for publication, managing a project research database, assisting with the development of an analytical framework, conducting a scoping review of accountability interventions and drafting an accountability mapping toolkit. The policy engagement component will involve working with knowledge specialists and research partners to develop outputs to support policy engagement and influence in the fields of accountability and health equity, and coordinating a major event to be held at IDS in July 2017.
